The new Buronga HealthOne facility is being delivered under the NSW Government's \$100 million Statewide HealthOne Program.

The project has come about following a landmark agreement between the NSW Government and the Barkandji Native Title Group Aboriginal Corporation to deliver a new integrated HealthOne facility in Buronga and servicing the Murray region from Wentworth to Balranald. The opportunity to develop the health facility on this site has been made possible with thanks to the Barkandji Nations.

Opening to patients and visitors on 14 July 2022, the following services will be provided:

Fast facts

- To support this landmark agreement a Cultural Engagement Strategy was developed and implemented to work with the Aboriginal Community, in particular the Barkandji Nation Group, to ensure the cultural initiatives are developed in a culturally responsive manner.
- The project team is working with the local Barkandji representatives to ensure the local culture is represented through the building. This will include artworks in waiting areas and pathways around the building, language for signage as well as a yarning circle, a relationship tree and a garden made up of plants with medicinal properties that reflect the services that will be provided at the new facility.
- The new facility was built by Barpa, a proud and dynamic Australian Indigenous construction company which includes:
 - 80,000L detention tank
 - 188m³ of concrete to the main slab
 - 28 ton structural steel
 - over 3000 concrete blocks
- Total indigenous employees 24 including 1 Barkandji apprenticeship employed from Mildura.
