

Economic Development Strategies 2024-2028

Balranald Shire Council and Wentworth Shire Council are now collaborating to develop Economic Development Strategies of each Council for 2024-2028.

These strategies will identify the strengths, challenges and opportunities of each Council as they seek the best possible outcomes for their residents, for existing industry/business and for future investments.

As neighbours with similar opportunities and barriers to growth, overlapping goals and actions will also be identified. This will result in Economic Development Strategies for each Council and overlapping strategies to support joint advocacy and action.

The goal of sustainable economic development is to improve the economic and social well-being of communities. This can be done by attracting and retaining business/ industry, creating/keeping employment, growing local workforce and enhancing the quality of life for all residents.

Economic Development should be strategic and community informed. It should improve life outcomes for all community members and support industry and population growth that enhances our communities and regions and protects our environments. With funding from the Department of Regional NSW, Balranald Shire Council and Wentworth Shire Council have employed local (Balranald based) researcher Rachael Williams (Local Logic Place) to hear from stakeholders including; residents of communities, business, industry, government and supporting agencies such as education and employment services. Together these voices will inform the development of the Economic Development Strategies.

Rachael will commence hearing from stakeholders in December 2023 and continue this listening until March 2024. Opportunities to connect with Rachael and inform the research will be advertised through newsletters and social media, community social media groups, local newspapers and community notice boards in each shire.

**PROJECT COMPLETED** 

#### **POONCARIE ROAD**

Council recommenced earthworks on the final 26.5 kilometres of unsealed road between Pooncarie and Wentworth Shire Council boundary in July 2023, following 8 months of flood related delays.

The \$9.2 million project is jointly funded on a 50:50 basis with the Australian Government and NSW Government under the Growing Local Economies Fund with the Office of Regional Development.

The upgrade allows road users to access the road in all weather conditions, removing over 600km of road detours when the road is impacted by wet weather-related road closures.

The Wentworth Shire section of the project was completed in early December, with bitumen sealing, guide posts, linemarking and signage completed by Council staff.



The following images were taken mid-December, with works on track for a June 2024 completion. Plaster, paint and tiling are underway, with the majority of the internal structure completed.




Council looks forward to opening the refurbished Civic Centre for the community once works are complete.

#### WENTWORTH CARAVAN PARK

Following the severe impact of flood water, works have recommenced at Wentworth Caravan Park, previously known as Willowbend Caravan Park.

The upgrade of the Caravan Park received funding in the 2021/2022 financial year, including one million dollars from the Crown Reserves Improvement Fund and two million dollars from the Council.

By the end of June 2023, the total expenditure was approximately 1.25 million dollars, representing about 40 percent of the total allocated funds.

The focus of the construction work is on finishing the western side of the park and the buildings by early March 2024. The completion of the remainder of the park is planned for April, coinciding with the start of a new park operator.





#### **Completed Works**

So far, the following tasks have been accomplished:

- Completion of designs
- Awarding contracts for the installation of services and the fabrication of buildings
- Filling and compacting to elevate the park surface to the necessary levels
- Full park-wide completion of stormwater installation
- Completion of sewer installation on the western side of the park, including the sewer pump station, and partial completion on the eastern side
- Installation of filtered water and electrical services on the western side
- Delivery of all materials required for the remaining service installations to the site
- Completion of off-site building fabrication, with internal fitting-out nearing its end

#### Future Works include:

- Road construction on the western side of the park
- Construction of concrete caravan pads on the western side
- Grass installation on the western side
- Retaining wall construction and landscaping along the riverfront
- Building installation
- Extension of services to the eastern side of the park





#### SEWER WORKS, WENTWORTH

In the later half of the 2023, old clay sewer pipes in Wentworth suffered a number of collapses. Repairs were required at both the Wentworth Primary School Oval and in Beverley Street. The sewer pipes at both of these locations are deep (between 5m and 6m below ground level). Significant works were required as difficult ground conditions were encountered and extended time of sewer bypass pumping was required. These works have now been completed with sewer services restored.

## **PROJECT COMPLETED**



#### **GOL GOL/BURONGA SHAREDWAY**

The following sharedways are being constructed at Gol Gol and Buronga, to assist with improved accessibility to various locations including Gol Gol Primary School and the Buronga Riverfront.

- Pine Street (200m) Complete
- Wood Street (600m) Complete
- Wood Streer/Gol Gol North Road (400m)
   Complete
- Buronga Wetlands to the Murray Riverfront (1800m) – 50% complete

The sharedways are designed to encourage residents to get physically active as part of Get NSW Active funding.

# WENTWORTH EFFLUENT DISPOSAL STATION (EDS)

The original Wentworth Effluent Disposal Station had a number of accessibility, operational and safety concerns.

The aging infrastructure is being upgraded with assistance of funding by NSW Government from Boating Now and Resources for Regions programs.

The upgraded EDS will include new pontoon, pumps and walkway. Continuing on the ability for effluent disposal in the Wentworth area for Houseboats and the like into the future.





#### JUNCTION ISLAND BRIDGE

The original Junction Island Bridge had a number of accessibility and safety concerns. The timber stairs particularly limited access to the tip of the Junction of the Murray and Darling Rivers. The bridge also prevented the ability to maintain any future infrastructure on the island.

A new bridge is in the process of being constructed which consists of a series of ramps enabling full access to the island. The bridge will also support the access of small maintenance machinery and equipment to maintain the island.

The bridge will also assist with a future project of installing a crusher dust footpath to the tip of the Junction and the potential of a viewing area.



## **EVENTS**

#### WENTWORTH COUNTRY MUSIC FESTIVAL TWILIGHT EVENT:

Following the Wentworth Country Music Festival, the Twilight Event held on 29 September 2023 extended the festivities on Darling Street. Attendees had the chance to explore local shops and browse market stalls, and enjoy live music. Local cafes and pubs provided various meals and snacks. This event was an excellent chance for the community to come together and spend a sunny day in Wentworth.



#### WENTWORTH TWILIGHT CHRISTMAS MARKETS:

Held on 1 December 2023, the Wentworth Twilight Christmas Markets included food vans, live music by Shadow Duo, Lucy, and James Herberte, and over 40 stalls with Christmas gifts. Activities like Santa photos, pony rides, and face painting for children were available, and local boutiques extended their hours. The event was well-received, and Council thanks everyone involved for their contributions.



#### **DARETON CHRISTMAS MARKETS:**

On 9 December 2023, the Dareton Christmas Markets included market stalls, free children's activities, and a community breakfast by Dareton Men in a Shed. Live music was provided by Shadow Duo. Additional activities included face painting, balloon animals, and a visit from Santa.



## HISTORY



# **CAPTAIN JOHN EGGE STATUE**

John Egge (c. 1830-1901), a Chinese riverboat captain was Born in Shanghai, China.

Arriving in Australia in 1852 in the boat, Queen of Sheba, owned by Francis Cadell. When Cadell opened the Murray River trade with paddle steamers, John (on the books as "John Bull"), served as the cook in each new ship Cadell launched. In 1856 he assumed by deed poll his Scandinavian surname.

Whilst establishing a piggery on Hindmarsh Island in Lake Alexandrina, South Australia, he met an English girl, Mary Perring, whom he courted by swimming the river to visit her, his clothes piled on his head.

### DARETON CENTENARY

Dareton is the centre of the Coomealla Irrigation Area, best known for its superior dried fruit and wine grapes. The irrigation area was once known as 'Nine Mile' and owes its existence, in part, to the visionary 'The Million Farms' scheme that flourished following World War One.

The cornerstone for Coomealla's ambitious horticultural development was laid in 1922, when Murray Lands Advisory Committee members inspected the area and recommended an irrigation scheme be established.

The town is named for Water Conservation and Irrigation Commissioner Henry Harvey Dare, a staunch proponent of the proposal.

It was his report to the Cabinet Committee on Land Development and Settlement that is generally held to have prompted the advisory committee inspection, tipping the scales in favour of the initiative.

Pioneering families sowed the seeds of irrigated horticulture here in the mid-to-late 1920s, but it was the influx of soldier-settlers following World War Two, under the auspices of the War Services Land Settlement Scheme, that supplied the impetus for rapid growth and development.

They came and conquered, transforming the bush landscape into a neat cross hatch pattern of flourishing vineyards and orchards, literally carving out a prosperous future by hard work and sweat.

Today Dareton, and the surrounding Coomealla Irrigation District, are together a thriving horticultural showpiece renowned for quality products.

It is also home to the renowned Coomealla Memorial Sporting Club and a mecca for freshwater fishermen while boasting one of the most picturesque championship golf courses in the country.


- two \$50 vouchers will be available in 2024 (\$50 in term 1 and \$50 in term 3)

# Stakeholder update



#### November 2023



The NSW Government is working with stakeholders and landholders to deliver a 32 km extension to the current NSW Border Wild Dog Fence (commonly known as the dog fence) on the NSW and South Australian borders. The 32 km priority section will close the gap between the NSW and South Australian dog fences.

#### Current project status

The project is focused on securing approvals and getting construction underway of the 32 km priority section. From 13 November 2023, the following activities are underway:



surveying of the proposed alignment



finalising documentation with adjoining landholders




Aboriginal cultural heritage mitigation works



procurement activities for construction services



coordinating the final clearance prior to construction starting



#### Next steps

After these activities are completed, construction will commence. During the summer months (December - February), construction may be limited to activities that can be carried out safely in the hot conditions.




#### **GREEN WASTE DISPOSAL VOUCHERS**
